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Continued from page 4: With its name derived from the nearby Old Lake, the course presents golfers with the challenge of numerous water hazards, particularly in the first nine holes. These water hazards certainly helped to lighten the load for some of the players in the IPG tournament, who lost a good number of balls in some of them. Whilst not an especially long course, Old Lake demands precision on all of its holes; players need to avoid not just the water but also the trees and areas of rough grass that line many of the fairways. It presents a fair challenge, however: it rewards players who seek to manage their way around the course, carefully choosing which clubs to play and playing within their game. The greens were good, running true if a little slow.

The tournament players were divided into five groups, two with four players and three with three players, and all teed off at the same time - a shotgun start - from different holes. This was intended to ensure that all the players ended at much the same time, though in practice, because of different numbers in the groups and with some players more experienced than others, this did not quite go to plan. The format was a Stableford competition, with full allowance for handicap but with a maximum handicap allowance of 28 for men and 36 for ladies. This format is believed to be the fairest, particularly for less experienced players, especially when playing on an unfamiliar course. The weather was hot, about 28* C, and very humid, with spots of rain late morning.

This sapped the strength of some of the players and it must be said that by the time all had finished, around 2.00 PM, everyone was ready for a drink and food.

The tournament was won by your writer, Robert Christensen, with 35 Stableford points; joint runners-up, both with 30 Stableford points, were Jeffrey Deane and Graham Wallace. Mention should also be made of Jakob Hotzl, who had the lowest gross score but, adjusted for his handicap of 6, had 28 Stableford points. Beatrix Doppler, also from Hotzl & Partner, had the best score of the ladies, with 29 Stableford points.

Hungary is all over your life: working with Microsoft Excel created by Károly Simonyi in 1974 late night in the office, while you have to change your soft contact lenses invented by István Györfy in 1959 to glasses; watching color television with your children or listening to an old gramophone with your husband or wife, both developed by Károly Péter Goldmark; mentioning to your clients Leonar3do, the virtual reality kit developed by

Dániel Rátai being presented to you on IPG Conference in Budapest.

You all have the possibility to take part in the next invention by doing business in Hungary, an open and multicultural environment having a highly educated workforce and keeping priority to attract foreign investors by its constantly developing legal environment, which had led companies, such as British Telecom, Exxon Mobil, Vodafone, Air France, GE, Alcoa, Morgan Stanley, IBM, Mercedes-Benz, Audi, Suzuki, Opel, Huawei Technologies and many others to locate facilities in Hungary. Incentives and grants are allocated on case-by-case basis following negotiations between the investor and the Government.

Foreigners may carry out continuous business activities in Hungary if they establish a Hungarian company or register a branch or representative office or permanent establishment (PE).

The industrial development had an effect on company law resulting in an electronic company registration process and swiftly accessible company data base. It is worth mentioning, that Hungarian legislator intends to initiate electronic judicial proceedings in the entire civil law as of 1 April
